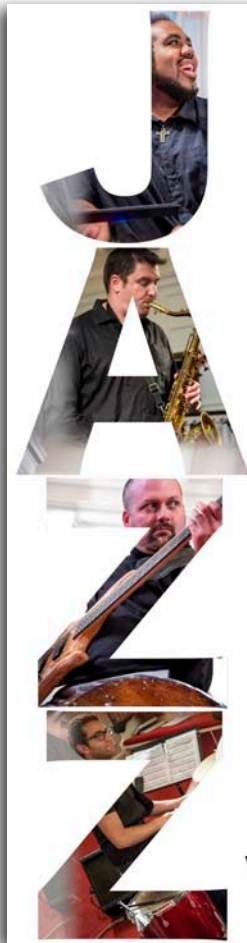

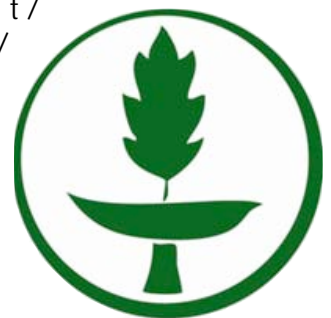
Green Sanctuary Kickoff

Reverently Yours

Not long ago when a band of more than a dozen interfaith clergy met in the aftermath of another surprise ICE raid on a community of undocumented immigrants, my call to revive the sanctuary movement or take some action to express our religious indignation was dismissed with a stunning pronouncement. I was informed: "Our congregations aren't political." It seemed to me that all these distinguished members of the clergy must have been absent from class when Jesus was discussed. Religion draped solely in piety robs it of its very power and mission to safeguard society from any and all moral violations against those who are powerless.

More recently, you may have read an opinion piece by Evan Mandery, professor at John Jay College of Criminal Justice, who severely critiqued the mindset of universities throughout the country for failing to divest the Endowment Funds from fossil fuel industries. University presidents justify their respective institutions from being exempt from "political causes" because the endowment is a resource for educational enhancement. It is as though the struggle to raise the bar for society's moral standard, lies as a separate issue among academicians doing research in the ivory towers of prestigious centers of higher learning.

University presidents can't even argue that the return on their investments is used for social good like financial aid programs. No, the elite private colleges remain bastions of privilege. So if our universities and our houses of worship renege on any commitment to a just world and a sustainable planet, are we surprised that hope lies beyond our reach? Given that religious and educational

institutions are not necessarily comprised of like-minded people, could there be a more important and instructive venue for the discussion of moral direction in our nation? For churches and colleges to shirk their responsibility as fountains for soul searching, selfless reflection, and influencing policy, is like the proverbial ostrich with its head in the sand.

That said, does our congregation need a reminder of why I am so inordinately proud to serve you? We were the first UU church in the nation to divest our funds at a congregational meeting, and did so unanimously. We were the second UU congregation in the nation to sign onto the New Sanctuary Movement. We don't compartmentalize much. We don't place moral struggles beyond our mission. We look honestly at the world and recognize that pleasant or not, politics and morality are intertwined. Jesus knew that; Gandhi knew that; Dr. King knew that.

If we are to advance society more equitably, I suggest that university presidents go back to school, and that the clergy return to seminary and pray with their eyes open. TRG
