Reverently Yours

Whenever I mention in passing that our church is celebrating its 125th anniversary in Utah, a glazed expression usually sweeps across the eyes of people who are (minimally) quite astonished. They may venture: "You mean the beginnings of Unitarianism generally?" "No," I reply, in Utah.

Why they seem embarrassed by their ignorance of this fact escapes me; they somehow feel they should have known. But it's a great way to begin discussing our past as well as what we're currently doing. As a congregation, maybe we ought to spend a little more time contemplating the future.

Radio West, hoisted by Doug Fabrizio, had me on their show along with Rev. John Buehrens, former UUA president and who is currently serving the UU Society in San Francisco. Doug acted quite surprised upon learning that Unitarianism extended much further back than the time of the American Revolutionary War. I wanted to put in a good plug for George Washington, who against great pressure from orthodox Christians not to hire John Murray as a chaplain for our soldiers, went ahead anyway and honored the man responsible for bringing Universalism to our shores from England. Indeed, America's Father of Universalism served our nation as chaplain in the Revolutionary War. (But there wasn't time to get into this during the show. Darn).


Doug, along with 99% of the American population was startled by our rich historical beginnings in 16th century Transylvania during the Protestant Reformation. He laughed when I explained we actually had a Unitarian King back then. The interview was fun, and John contributed a lot to the conversation.

Our 125th anniversary, to be celebrated for sure, also raises a need to renew our memory of history and trigger some critical reflection about our role as progressive religious thinkers in the Salt Lake Valley. It really is quite stunning to think about our longevity in a conservative environment, what we've accomplished, and where we intend to go in the decades ahead.

Especially as new people join with our congregation, it may be time for both a review of where we've been and some creative thinking to determine the direction we need to go. Given the division in our nation along religious/cultural lines, the increasing growth in secularism, and the idea of community interpreted more as meaning "virtual" community through technology, we must focus not only on Unitarianism twenty years from now, but prepare for more immediate concerns.

I look forward to more discussion among ourselves as to next steps, new concepts, and how to remain religiously relevant in these changing times. It will be exciting for I am sure we all have very different ideas. (What else is new?) Please begin to articulate some ideas about our church in the near future. We would be well served by drawing a blueprint for our future right about now. The 125th anniversary gives plenty of justification to move ahead in our thinking. TRG

In the Life

You never know where connection will take you.

In one of my first Sundays with you I shared a reading from Terry Tempest Williams' "Refuge." It was a long shot...a Hail Mary pass...and here my sports references are exhausted. I confessed in that service that I'd never read TTW's work before, but was introduced to her when I'd asked Tom about some "native" Utah voices. The excerpt I shared in service recalled the author/activist's experience with the threatened habitat of burrowing owls, among other birds, at the Bear River Migratory Bird Refuge just up the road to the north of us here in Salt Lake City.

Following the service Sylvia Gray inquired as to whether I was a birder. (I am not.) Sylvia then offered to take me up to Bear River sometime, as it is a favorite place of hers. This was in September. Imagine my surprise when, in February, Sylvia reminded me of her offer and we began examining our calendars. In the tail end of March I was fortunate enough to be introduced to the Refuge and the world of birding by Sylvia along with a few other veterans (thank you Nancy and Carole!). I began the day-trip knowing and vaguely curious about a handful of birds and ended the day with a list of over thirty species we'd seen.

Now my eyes are often tracking the movements of birds in the trees around me. Now my ears are often listening for different songs, calls...even rustles of grass and leaf.

I'd set out to find a reading that would in some way introduce me to this land and communities. I wound up succeeding in that and being introduced in much more intimate and immediate ways...ways that carry on into my daily life and surroundings...even when I'm away on vacation!

In this season of spring, new life, liberation and life passages (graduations, comings of age, child dedications), I urge you to pay attention to your connections. How are the relationships

Declaring a Global Warming State of Emergency.

*Friday, May 6, 2016, 7:00PM, Eliot Hall;
Association for the Tree of Life*

The ecological bottleneck we face and the Climate Crisis we are already experiencing are both terrifying and overwhelming. Particularly since so little that is effective has been forthcoming for a very long time. When we face the scope, scale and urgency of these unprecedented crises, simultaneously intertwined with the necessity of addressing Environmental and Climate Justice, how can we find hope and encouragement?

The Association for the Tree of Life (ATL) takes seriously the global warming emergency and is working to implement effective responses that meet the scope, scale, and urgency of the crisis. ATL is leading the call and catalyzing the broad-based media, educational, and grassroots campaigns that can result in an Emergency Climate Mobilization to produce net zero US carbon emissions within a decade.
