# In the Life

It's happened twice now...two Sundays in a row.

I can't find the word to describe it, so let me just explain it to you and see what you'd call it.

Some Sundays I have the rare privilege of "floating."

What I mean by this is that I have no commitment that requires me to stay in one place for the duration of a worship service. I may begin by greeting folks in Eliot Hall, continue by checking in with a junior high or high school classroom, have a side conversation or two in a hallway. Usually I spend some time in the "overflow" section in Eliot Hall, where the service is playing on the screen and people are drinking coffee, staffing their tables in wait for coffee hour, watching the worship service, holding their children, etc.

It was one of those "floating" Sundays that it happened.

The worship service was about Environmentalism and Reconnecting to Hope. Several speakers shared their perspectives and convictions with passion and eloquence.

Eliot Hall had an unusual assortment of tables for environmentally related causes and organizations.

I witnessed our guest artists - storytellers that week - working with elementary-aged kids. They brainstormed favorite stories and then identified the components of stories and began practicing telling them and acting them out.

I got a brief glimpse of our Coming of Age youth - 7th and 8th graders. They were practicing public speaking with a congregational leader, some using the words of the Gettysburg Address. Practice for giving their faith statements on May 1. They were talking about what it felt like to speak in front of their peers...and how it feels different when the words are your own.

I also got to listen in on the High Schoolers, 9th-12th graders. They were engaged in an exercise about privilege, unpacking the

meanings and implications of it...exploring dynamics around winners and losers, competition for resources, following rules.

# Environmental Ministry News

## More Recycling

Environmental Ministry has added another stream of waste to its recycling fundraiser: hair care, skin care, and cosmetic product packaging. What is accepted? Hair care packaging including such items as shampoo caps, conditioner caps, hair gel tubes, hair spray triggers, and hair paste caps, skin care packaging such as lip balm tubes and caps, soap dispensers and tubes, body was caps, lotion dispensers and caps. Cosmetic packaging such as lip balm tubes, eye shadow cases, bronzer cases, foundation packaging, powder cases, eyeliner cases, eye shadow tubes, concealer tubes and sticks, and lip liner pencils. Most of these items are not recyclable through our municipal waste recycling programs and each item is worth 2¢ to First Unitarian Church. Bring them to the Environmental Ministry table on Sunday mornings and keep all these little things out of the landfill!

When we face the scope, scale and urgency of these unprecedented crises, simultaneously intertwined with the necessity of addressing Environmental and Climate Justice, how can we find hope and encouragement? The Association for the Tree of Life (ATL) takes seriously the global warming emergency and is working to implement effective responses that meet the scope, scale, and urgency of the crisis. ATL is leading the call and catalyzing the broad-based media, educational, and grassroots campaigns that can result in an Emergency Climate Mobilization to produce net zero US carbon emissions within a decade.
