

Two members of First Unitarian to Speak on Interfaith Panel at “Live More with Less” Conference

Live More with Less Conference

It is no longer sufficient to merely protest “supply side” assaults on the environment such as coal-fired power plants, fracking, tar sands & oil shale in Utah, the Keystone XL pipeline, nuclear power, etc. These protests are helpful but address only one-half of the problem—the supply of dirty energy. The other half of the problem is the demand for dirty energy. As long as demand for gasoline and electricity continues unabated, fossil and nuclear energy will find their way to the market despite protests. This is why many of Utah’s faith communities and universities are joining hands to sponsor a “demand-side” conference that explains how, for most people living here, a switch to a more modest lifestyle with a smaller use of natural resources is necessary, and in fact urgent, if we are to prevent unacceptable climate damage for the younger generation alive today. Modest lifestyles without overuse of Earth’s natural bounty are essential to earth stewardship—embraced by nearly every religious faith. Voluntary simplicity by all who are blessed with affluence is an act of compassion because it frees up resources so that the many people living in poverty can satisfy their basic human needs. Such a change in lifestyle makes people happier, allowing them more time for friends, family, and for community activities.

Richard Heinberg, Senior Fellow at the Post Carbon Institute, and author of eleven best-selling books including *The End of Growth* will address how we must change to avoid the worst outcomes posed by our current economic and ecological predicament.



Other speakers include: Rick Gill, professor of Biology at BYU and expert in the field of planetary boundaries; Erin Silva, faculty at University of Utah’s College of Architecture and Planning, who writes and lectures worldwide on designing sustainable cities; and WARNER WOODWORTH, BYU professor (retired), humanitarian, “renaissance man”, author, developer of micro-credit programs, who will share how we can look to Utah’s pioneer forbearers for guidance in eliminating poverty in our midst.

Rev. Harold Straughn and Carole Straughn will represent First Unitarian Church on a panel of faith leaders and will speak about their transition to a more sustainable way of living and about our 7th Principle. Environmental Ministry is one of 10 co-sponsors of this FREE conference being organized by the Mormon Environmental Stewardship Alliance and the local university, faith-based, and non-profit communities.
